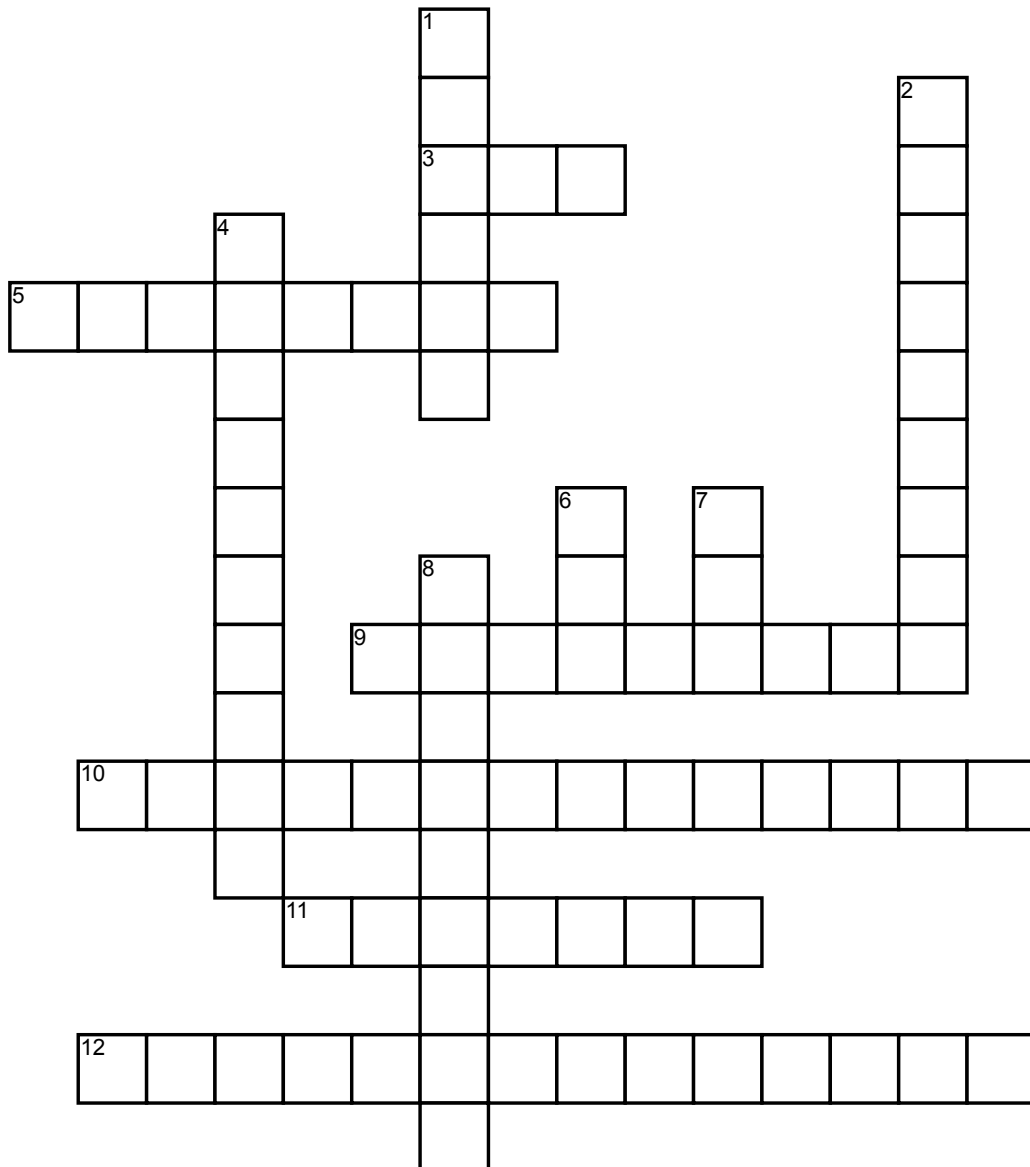

- 3.** A particular reinforcement schedule in which reinforcement is delivered for behaviors which are incompatible with the target response.
- 5.** The base rate of behavior, before intervention, against which the efficacy of experimental manipulations is compared.
- 9.** This is when a learner responds to a demand by either receptively or expressively linking several responses together. For example, if shown a photo of a firefighter and asked "Who is this?" the learner responds by saying "Doctor/Teacher/Firefighter"

10. Subjects are repeatedly required to engage in appropriate, correcting, and incompatible behaviors.

11. Reinforcing successive approximations to the required (target) response.

12. A form of stimulus control in which the subject responds differentially to stimuli that share too few relevant features.

1. A procedure in which a stimulus is gradually increased or decreased in intensity. Can be used to transfer control from one stimulus to another.

2. The explicit training of a supplemental stimulus (SD) that increases the probability of a response.

4. A stimulus (or event) whose availability shortly following the target response increases the future likelihood of that response.

6. A particular reinforcement schedule in which reinforcement is delivered for behaviors other than the target response.

7. A particular reinforcement schedule in which reinforcement is delivered for rates of responding below a specified criterion.

8. A symptom of autism in which the child repeats spoken language and fails to exhibit normal verbal behaviors.
