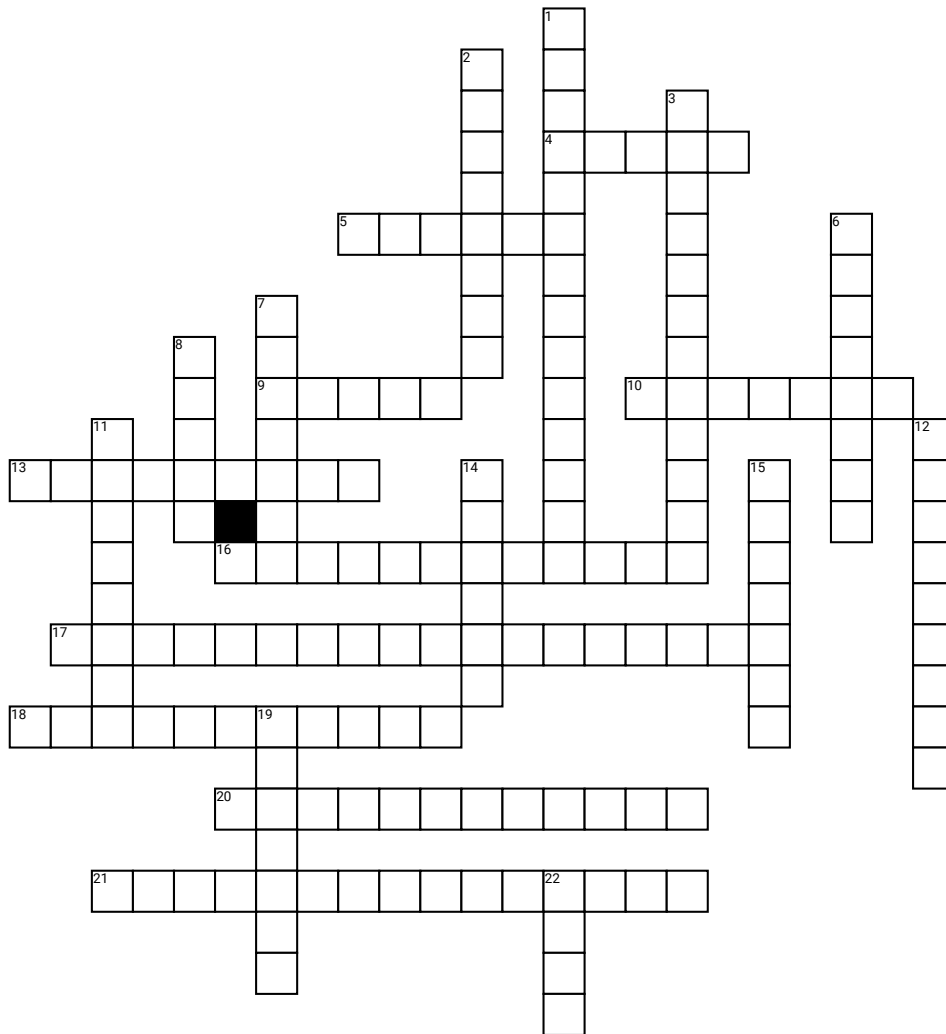

- 13. A form of logical reasoning that joins two or more premises to arrive at a conclusion
- 16. Intended to arouse angry or hostile feeling; the opposite of conciliatory
