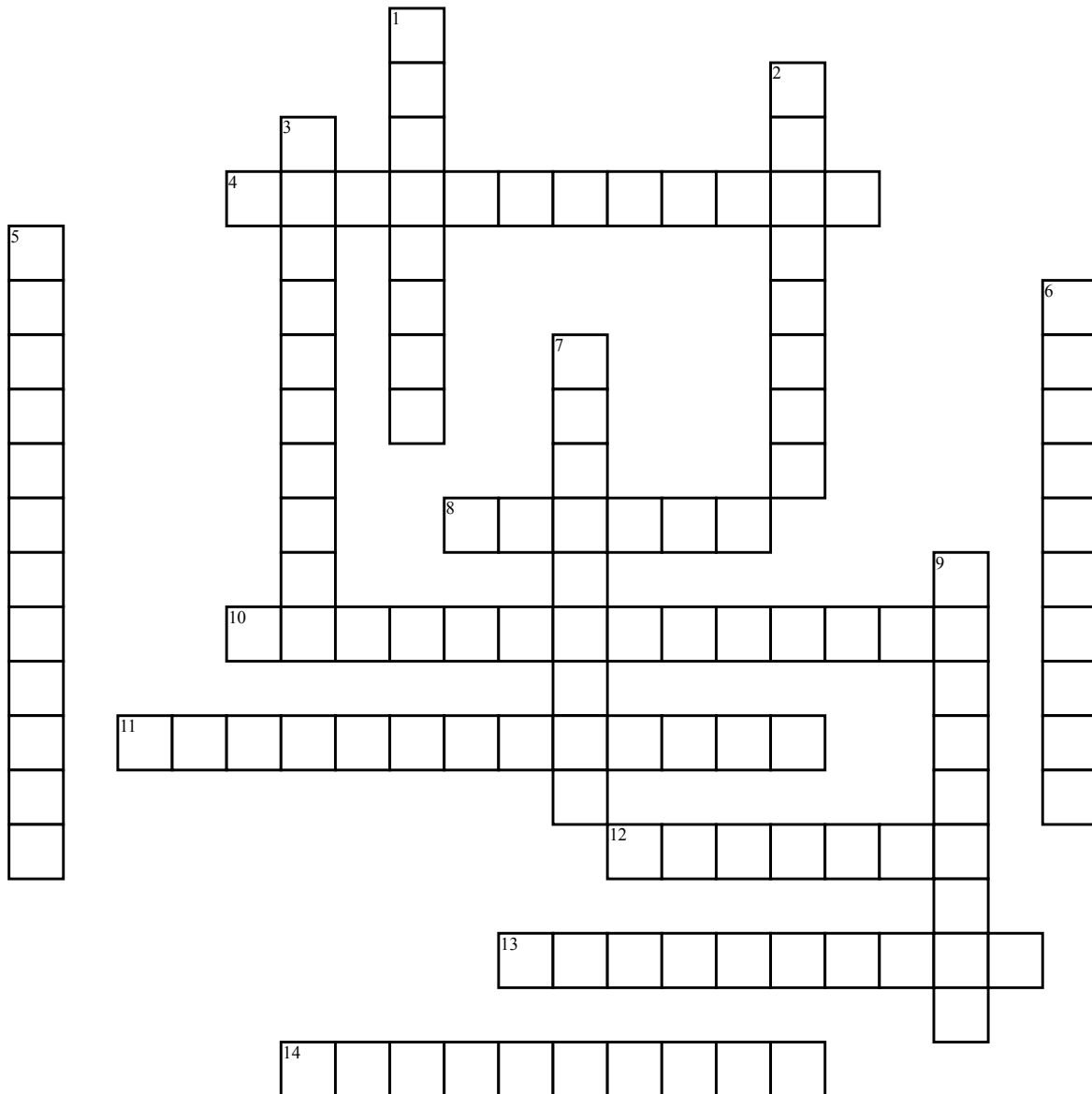


Bilingual Children: Difference vs. Disorder

- 8. Errors in this area may be due to differences of word orders used in differing languages
- 10. L2
- 11. L1
- 12. A linguistic variation that is attributable primarily to geographic region or foreign language background

- 13. In some cultures, directive language (giving commands, requests, suggestions, etc.) can only be used by the elderly to youth, employers to employees, parents to children, teachers to students
- 14. Learning a primary native language first (usually before age 3) and then learning a second language at a later time

Down

- 1. Faye's first language
- 2. Characterized by deficits in the comprehension and/or production of both L1 and L2
- 3. Result of the normal process of acquiring a second language
- 5. Acquisition of two languages at the same time (usually before the age 3)
- 6. Pronouns, verb conjugation and verb inflection structures, and tenses are not constant across languages
- 7. Differing phonological patterns resulting from transfer or interference from another language
- 9. Specific words and/or word categories may exist in one language, but not in another
