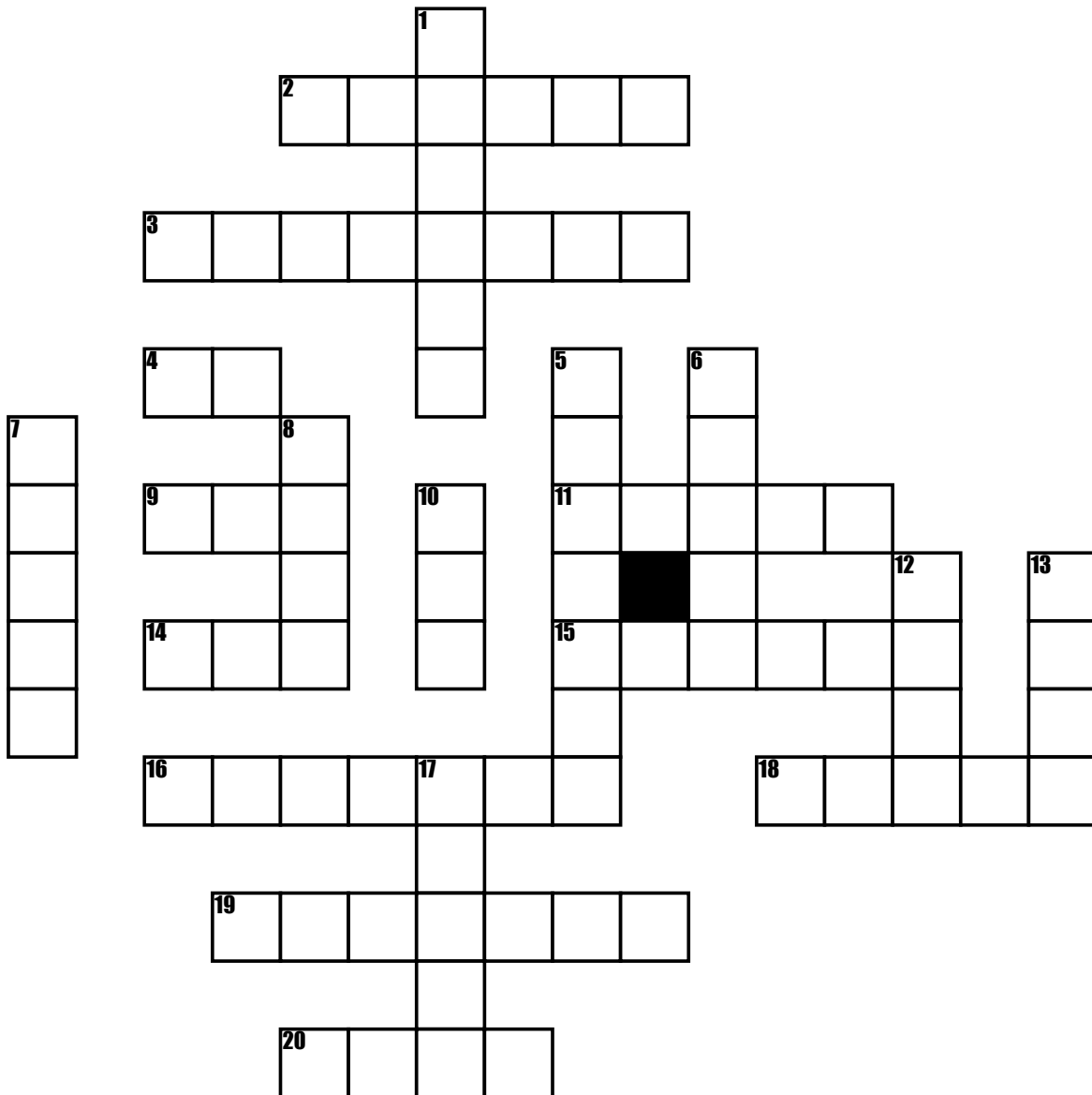


COMMONLY CONFUSED WORDS

- 2. means excluding or with the exception of.
- 3. a phrase meaning “completely prepared,” as in “As soon as I put my coat on, I’ll be all ready.”
- 4. a preposition with several meanings, including “toward” and “until.”
- 9. two is pronounced the same as to and too, but it can’t be used instead of either of them because it’s a number
- 11. refers to a real thing (plain with an i: I see a plain),
- 14. a preposition meaning “because of,” “directed to,” or “in favor of.” As an adjective,

- 15. a contraction of “they are” or “they were.”
 - 16. a building in which the legislative body of government meets.
 - 18. in or to what place or position.
 - 19. an adverb used to describe something that has happened before a certain time, as in “What do you mean you’d rather stay home? I’ve already got my coat on.
 - 20. is a contraction of “we are.”

 - 5. can refer to uppercase letters,

- 6. can be used to discuss an abstract flat and level surface, usually in geometric mathematics.
