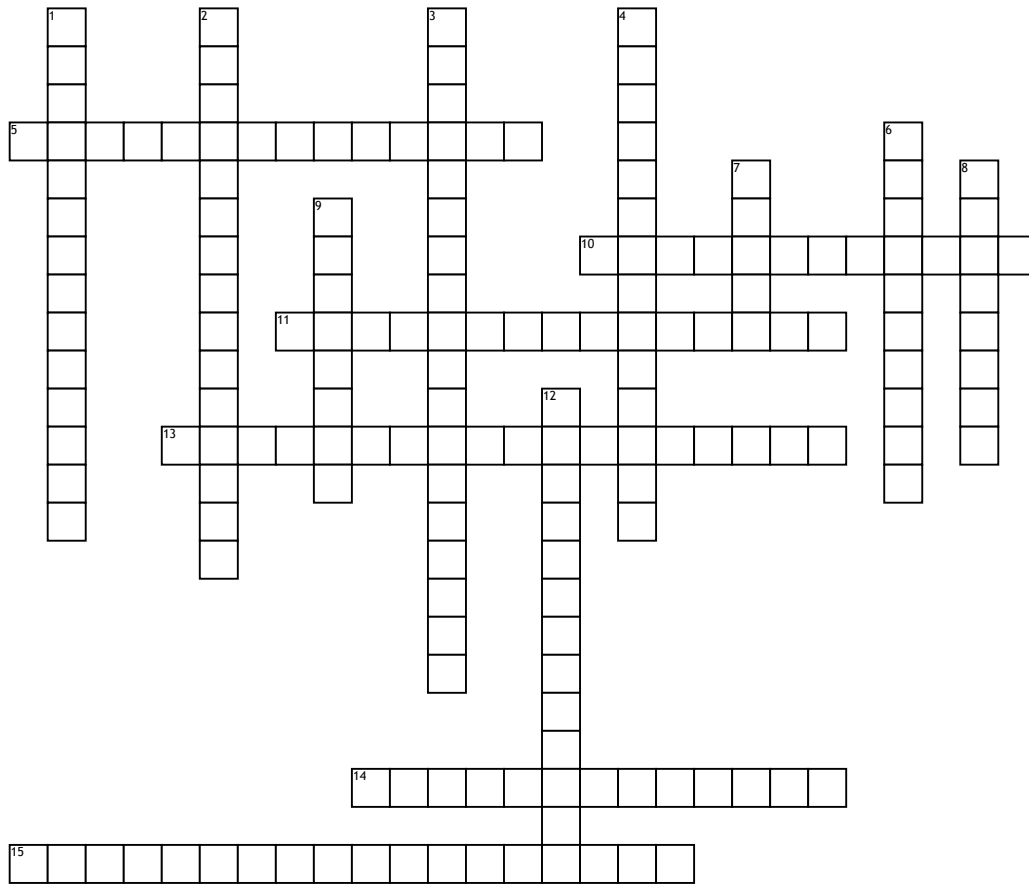


Chap. 3 The Colonies Come of Age

10. An economic system in which nations seek to increase their wealth and power by obtaining large amounts of gold and silver and by establishing a favorable balance of trade.

11. An English policy of relaxing the enforcement of regulations in its colonies in return for the colonies' continued economic loyalty.

13. A conflict in the North America, lasting from 1754 to 1763, that was part of a worldwide struggle between France and Britain and that ended with the defeat of France and the transfer of French Canadian to Britain.

15. The transfer of the British monarchy from James II to William and Mary in 1688-1689.

1. A revival of religious feeling in the American colonies during the 1730s and 1750s.

2. A transatlantic system of trade of which goods and people, including slaves, were exchanged between Africa, England, Europe, the West Indies, and the colonies in North America.

3. An order in which Britain prohibited its American colonists from settling west of the Appalachian Mountains.

4. A 1739 uprising of slaves in the South Carolina, leading to the tightening of already harsh slave laws.

7. A person who becomes the property of others.

8. A crop grown by a farmer for sale rather than for personal use.

9. A trade law enacted by parliament in 1764 in an attempt to reduce smuggling in the British colonies in North America.
