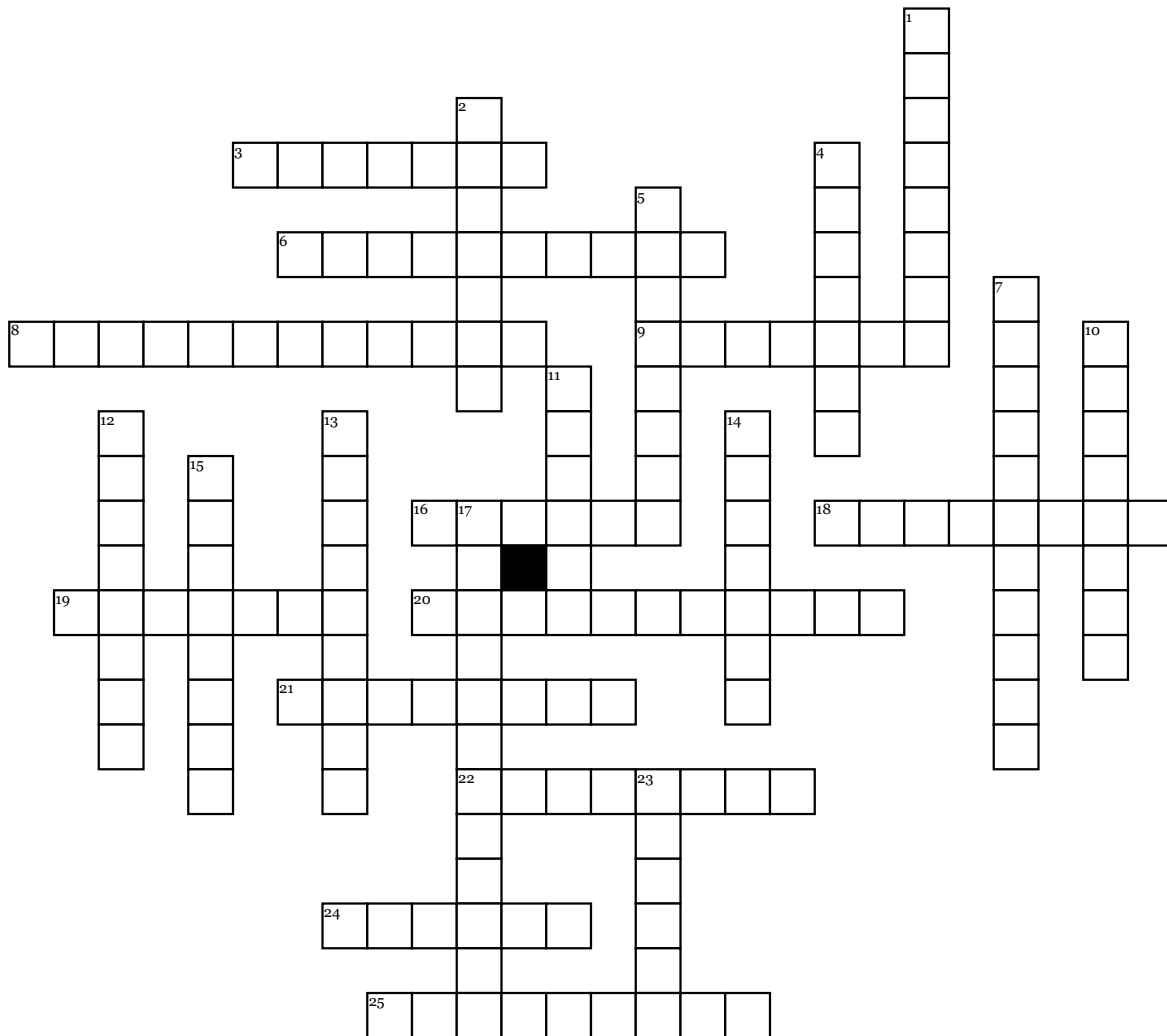


Civil War

- 6. Term for a Northerner who opposed the war effort.
- 8. The North's strategy to win the war (Created by General Winfield Scott).
- 9. African Americans (and some Native Americans) that were owned by other people, usually white, and forced to labor on their behalf.
- 16. A Northerner; someone loyal to the Federal government of the United States.
- 18. Hard crackers often issued to soldiers of both sides during the Civil War.
- 19. The distance around the inside of a gun barrel measured in thousands of an inch.
- 20. Escaped slaves who fled to the Union lines for protection.

- 21. A group of soldiers stationed at a military post.
- 22. Manufacturing goods from raw materials, such as cloth from cotton or machine parts from iron.
- 24. To formally approve or sanction.
- 25. Cannon or other large caliber firearms; a branch of the army armed with cannon.

- 1. A soldier who was wounded, killed, or missing in action.
- 2. A place where weapons and other military supplies are stored.
- 4. Round container used to carry water.
- 5. The cruel killing of a number of helpless or unresisting people.
- 7. Phrase used to describe soldiers who were either new to the military or had never fought in a battle before.

- 10. A crop such as tobacco or cotton--not grown for food like corn or wheat.
- 11. A smoothbore firearm fired from the shoulder. Thrust from exploding powder shoots the bullet forward like a chest pass in basketball.
- 12. The term used for military supplies, such as weaponry and ammunition.
- 13. Small canvas bag, about one foot square, used to carry a soldier's food.
- 14. A large earthen mound used to shield the inside of a fortified position from artillery fire and infantry assault.
- 15. The basic unit of the Civil War soldiers, usually made up of 1,000 to 1,500 men.
- 17. Someone who wishes to abolish or get rid of slavery.
- 23. withdraw formally from membership of a federal union, an alliance, or a political or religious organization.
