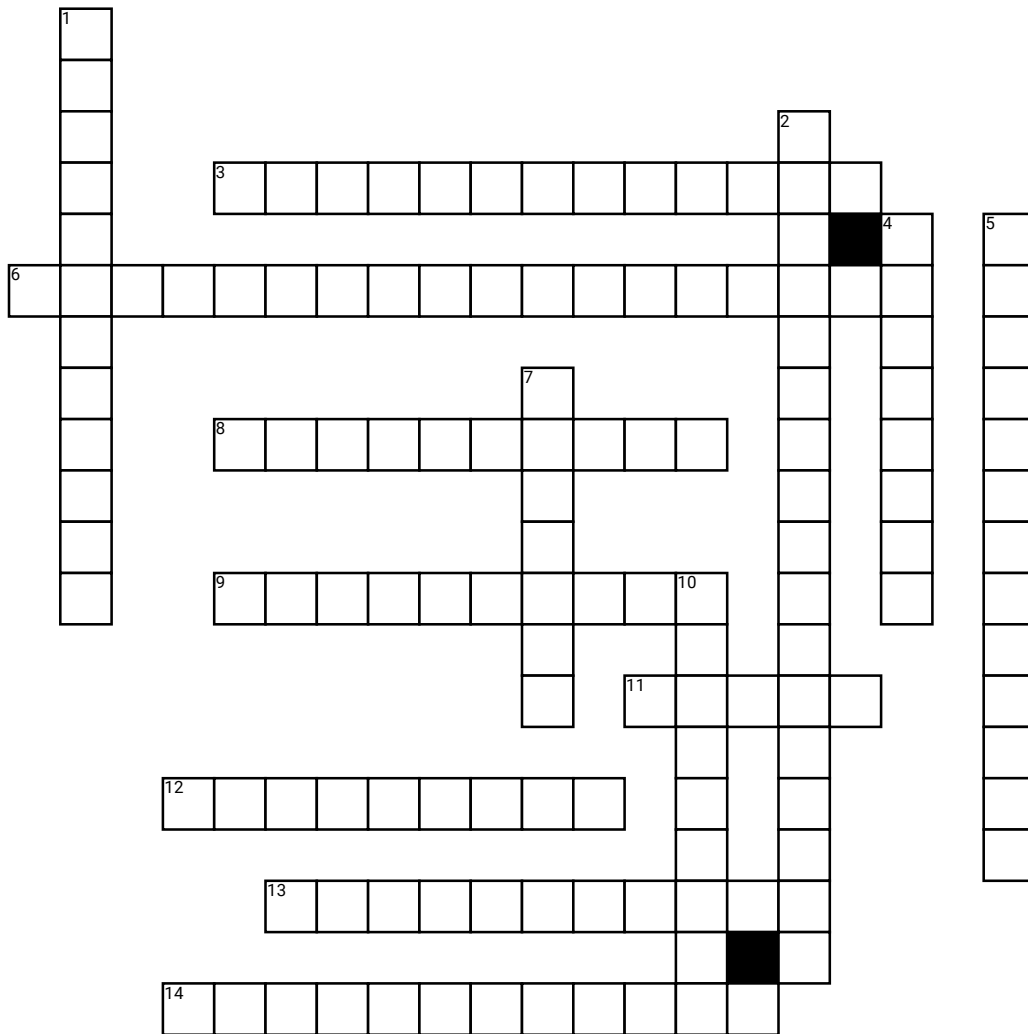

- 3. a person from the northern states who went to the South after the Civil War to profit from the Reconstruction
- 6. the principle that the authority of a state and its government are created and sustained by the consent of its people, through their elected representatives, who are the source of all political power.
- 8. restrictive laws designed to limit the freedom of African Americans and ensure their availability as a cheap labor force after slavery was abolished during the Civil War.
- 9. African Americans who fled North Carolina because of economic and political grievances after the Reconstruction era
- 11. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People

- 12. the action of withdrawing formally from membership of a federation or body, especially a political state
 - 13. the systematic practice of discriminating against and segregating Black people
 - 14. were administered to prospective voters, and this had the effect of disenfranchising African Americans and others with diminished access to education

- 1. loyalty to one's own region or section of the country, rather than to the country as a whole
 - 2. A half-dozen states passed laws that made men eligible to vote if they had been able to vote before African-Americans were given the franchise, or if they were the lineal descendants of voters back then.

- 4. is the practice whereby a swarm-generally a few dozen of a few hundred people - goes rogue so as to harm and murder a man blamed for some wrongdoing
- 5. abolished slavery
- 7. Begun in the 1890s as a legal way to keep African Americans from voting in southern states, poll taxes were essentially a voting fee. Eligible voters were required to pay their poll tax before they could cast a ballot.
- 10. a white Southerner who collaborated with northern Republicans during Reconstruction, often for personal profit. The term was used derisively by white Southern Democrats who opposed Reconstruction legislation.
