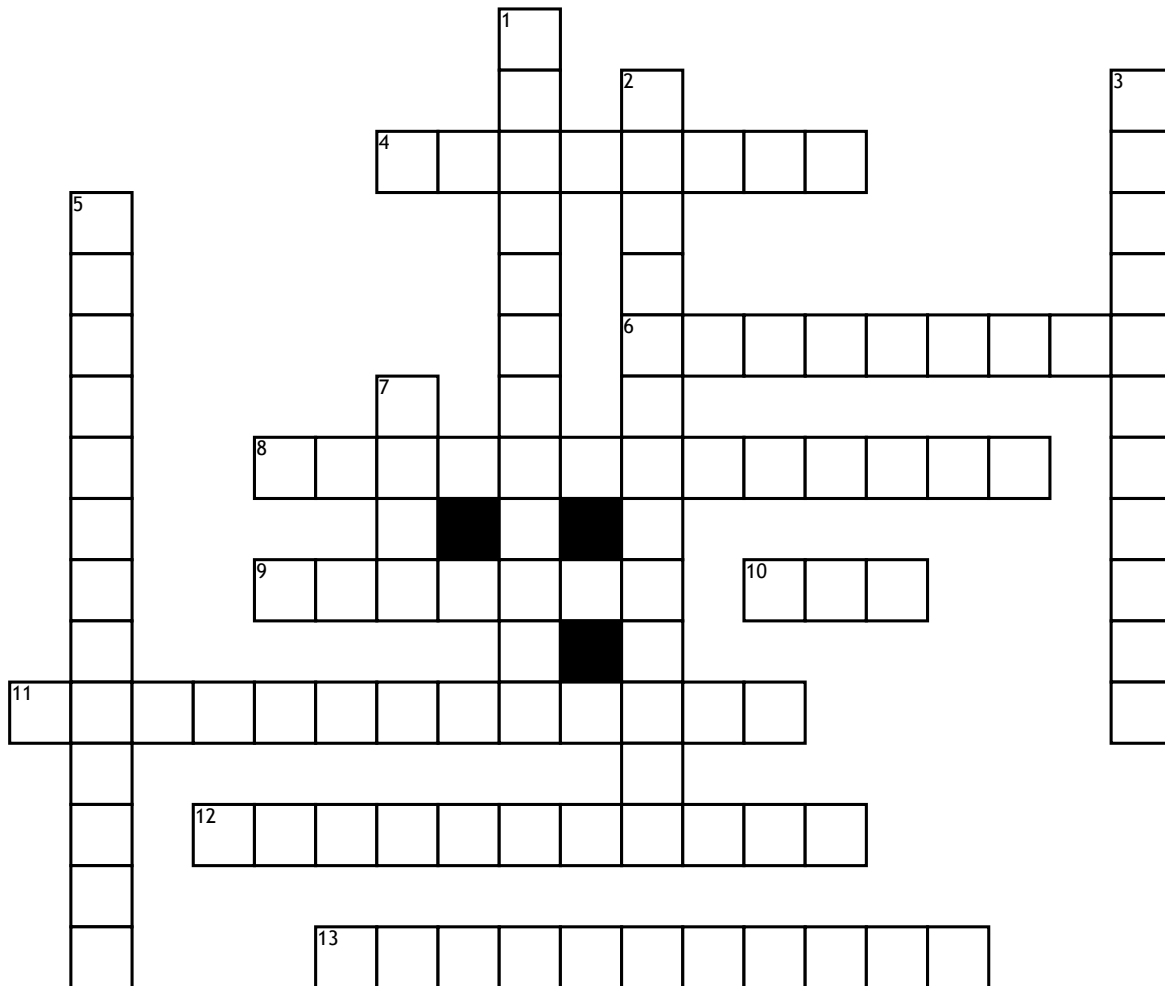


Cognition and Aging

10. Cognitive losses that may portend the diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease (AD). (Abbr)

1. A condition in which one suffers from a poorly balanced diet or has a deficiency in the digestive system.

5. Actively using or manipulating information from a short-term storage base. For example, recalling a telephone number and actually dialing the number to make a call (one must retain the number while dialing). (2 words)
