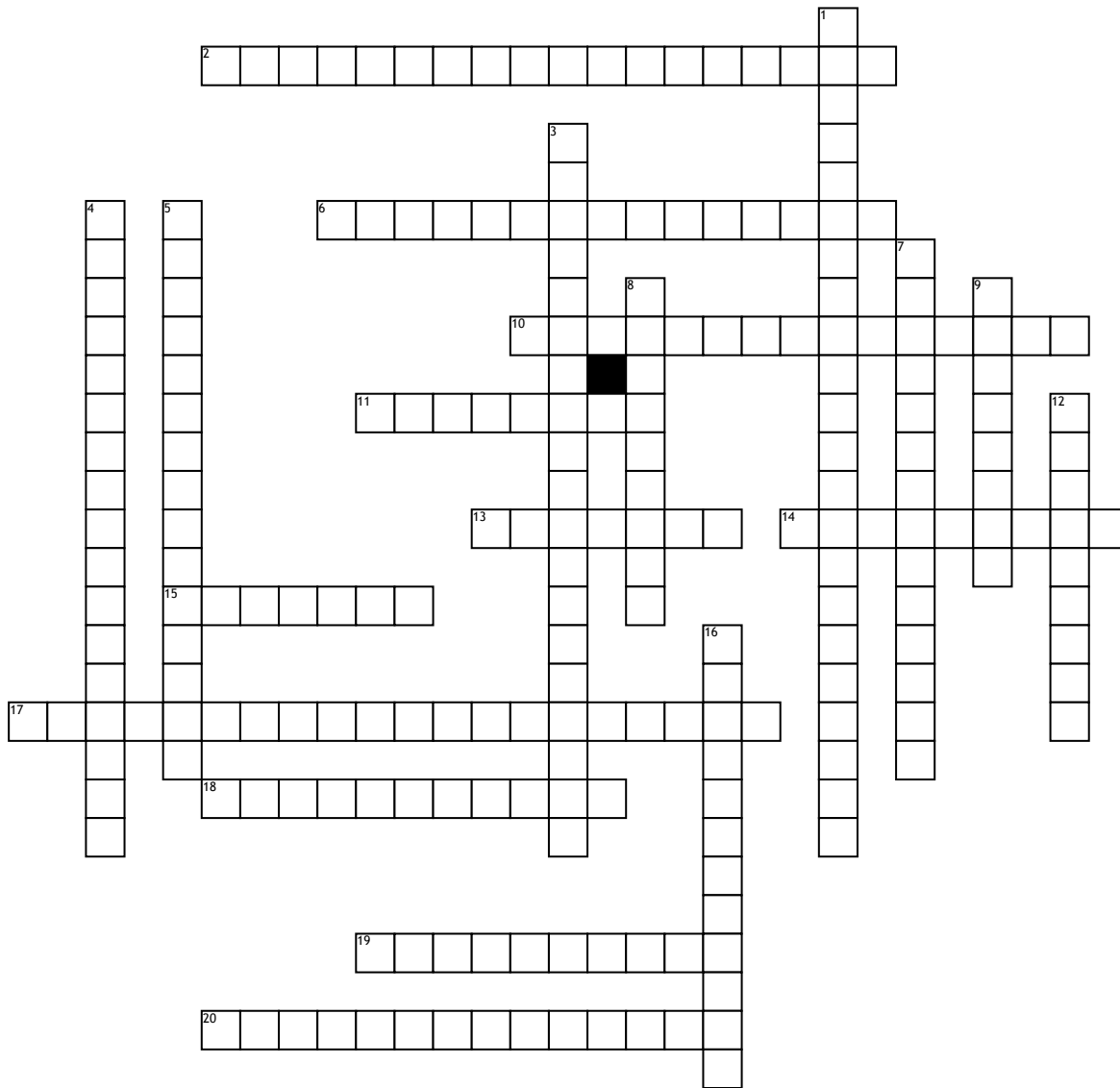


# Composing Your Speech
