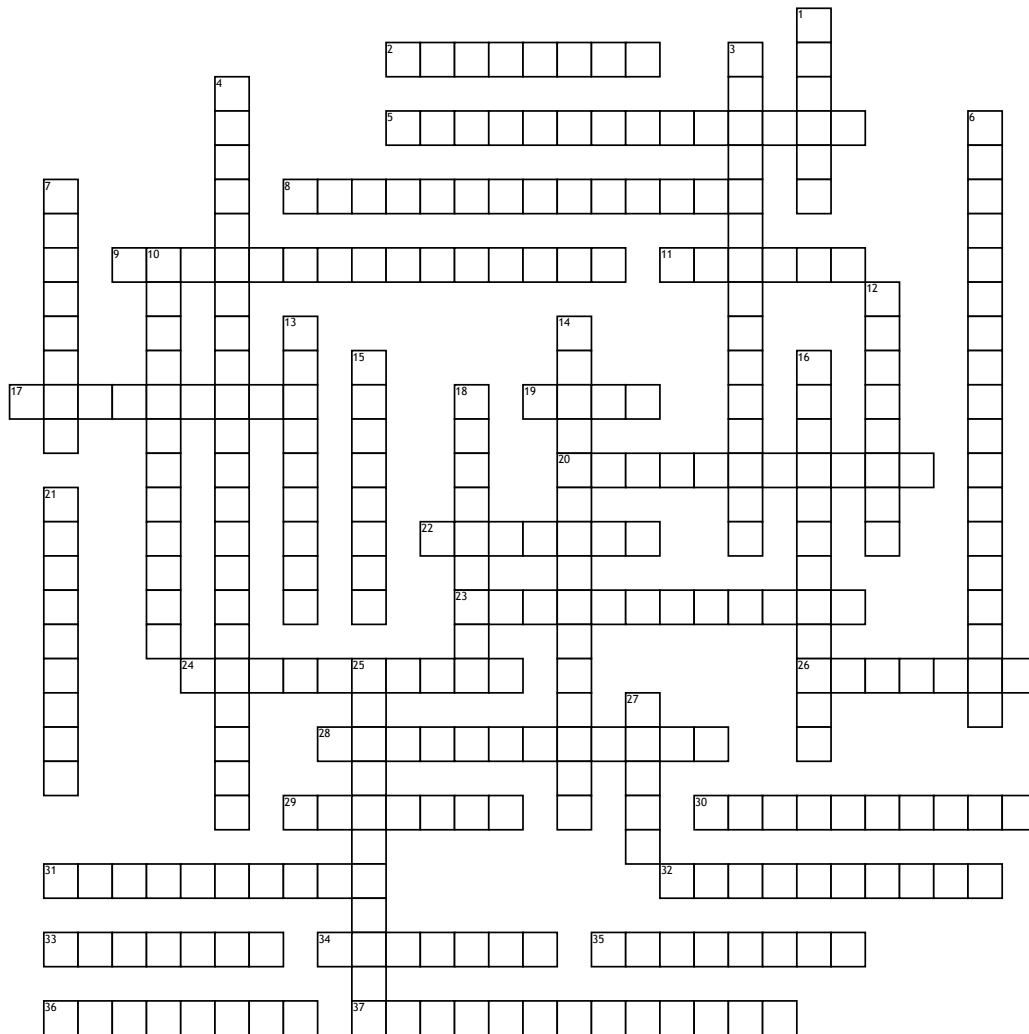

 - 24. The Great Charter, which guaranteed the English people certain civil rights and limited the powers of the monarch

 - 28. Settlement and control of the lands of others for the purpose of extracting resources

 - 30. The legislative body in England
 - 31. To settle a dispute, with both sides giving up a part of what they demand
 - 32. Any Christian not belonging to the Roman Catholic or Eastern Orthodox Church
 - 33. To take goods by force
 - 34. An act forbidding anyone except members of the Church of England from holding political office or entering the professions
 - 35. A government where there is no king or queen; power rests with the citizens who vote to elect their leaders

 - 37. A fleet of ships sent by Spain in 1588 to invade England

 - 3. A king, queen, emperor, or empress with unlimited power
 - 4. A form of government in which a monarch acts as head of state, but his or her powers are limited by a constitution

 - 7. A supporter of Charles I; derived from the french word chevalier, meaning "horseman"
 - 10. Careless and lavish spending, wastefulness
 - 12. A ruler with unrestricted authority
 - 13. A government that is controlled by the people who live under it
 - 14. The official church in England, headed by the monarch
 - 15. When two or more groups in a country fight each other for control of that country
 - 16. Wagons of supplies, as well as people, needed to support the army
 - 18. A follower of the teachings of John Calvin, a leader of the Protestant Reformation
 - 21. A person given special treatment
 - 25. Jewellery used but not personally owned by the royal family
 - 27. A payment of one-tenth of a persons earnings
