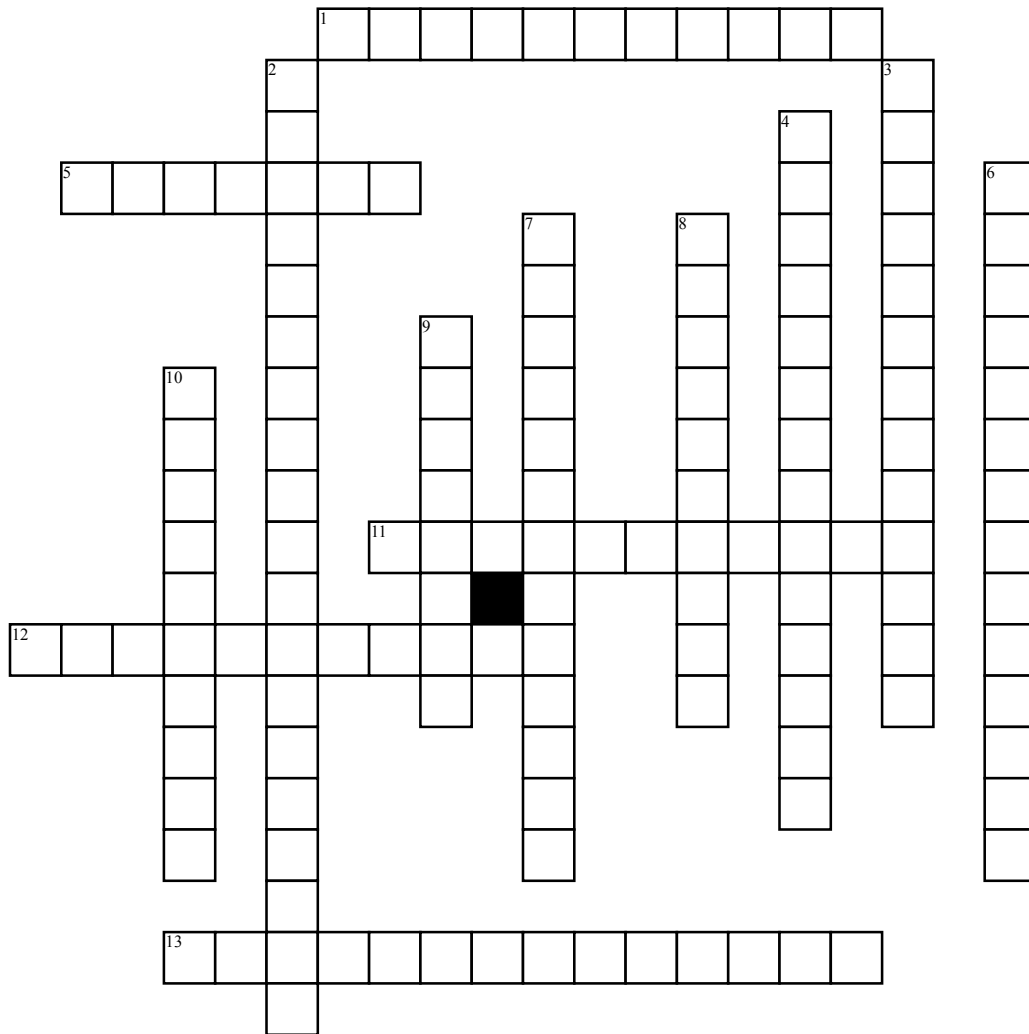

2. Process by which companies move industrial jobs to other regions with cheaper labor, leaving the region to switch to a service economy and to work through a period of high unemployment.  
 3. The expansion of economic, political, and cultural processes to the point that they became global in scale and impact; transcends state boundaries and have outcomes that vary across places and scales.  
 4. A process or industry that requires large amounts of human effort to produce goods.

6. The stock of basic facilities and capital equipment needed for the functioning of a country or area.  
 7. The process of industrial deconcentration in response to technological advances and/or increasing costs due to congestion and competition.  
 8. A metropolitan area given official health to strengthen its economic development.  
 9. A commercial center where goods are received for distribution, transshipment, or repackaging.  
 10. A form of tourism that supports the conservation and sustainable development of ecologically unique areas.
