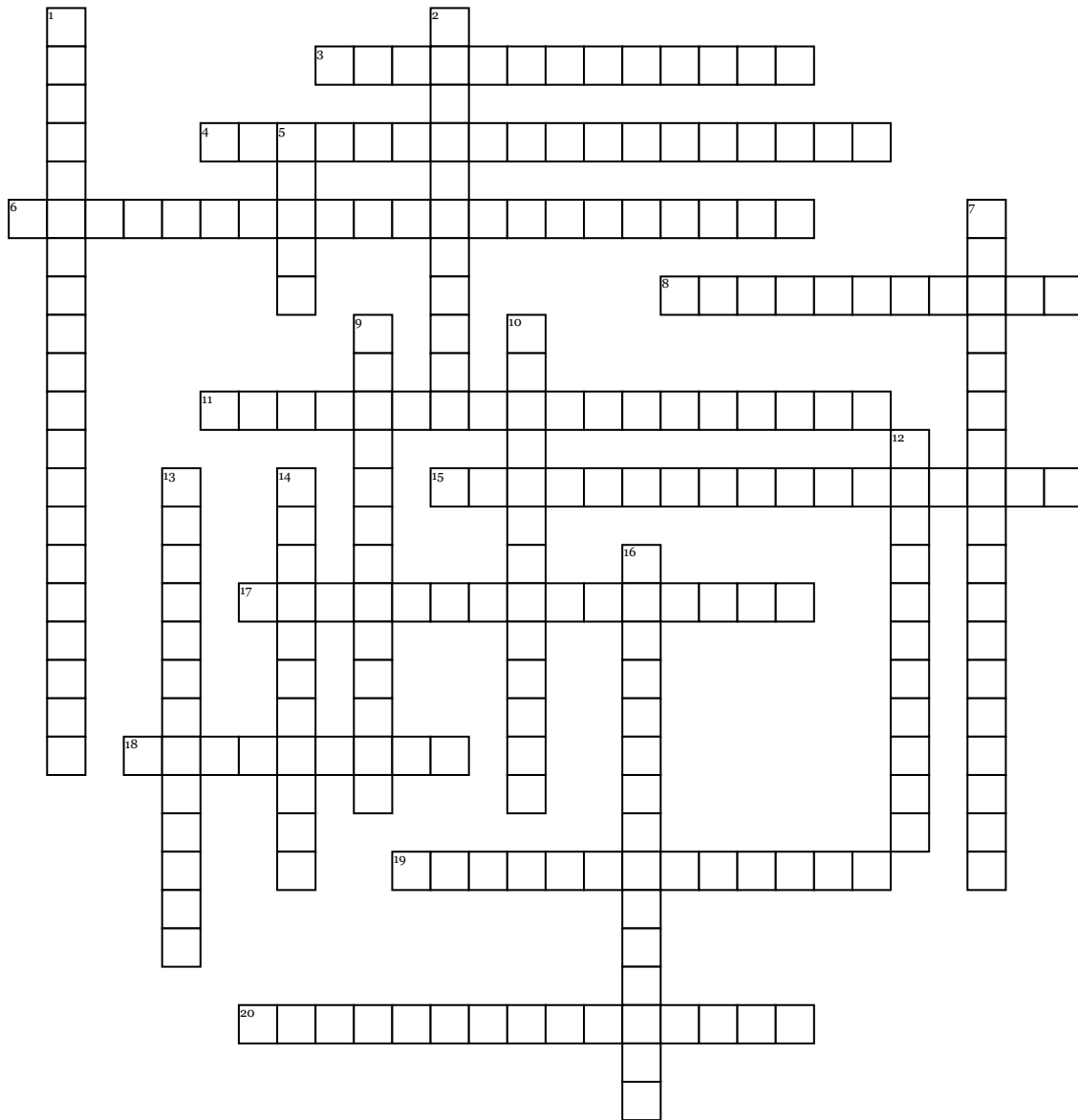


Jim Crow & Civil Rights Movement

- 3.** The Amendment that abolished slavery.
- 4.** The constitution that states that African men were allowed to vote and hold office.
- 6.** The Supreme Court ordered the integration of public schools.
- 8.** Laws that restricted voting through poll taxes and literacy tests, and continued to limit social, political, and economic opportunities of African Americans.
- 11.** The constitution that stated that made separate schools for black and white children it also made the Jim Crow laws.
- 15.** The clause that protected poor farmers or/and illiterate white voters.
- 17.** The senator of 1895 who wanted a new state constitution to replace the Reconstruction constitution of 1868.

- 18.** Another name for white Democrats.
- 19.** The Amendment that protects the rights of Americans to vote in elections to elect their leaders.
- 20.** This Massacre happened in Aiken County. 6 black militia members were killed by a white mob.

- 1.** The act that prohibited discrimination in public places, provided for the integration of schools and other public facilities and made employment discrimination illegal.
- 2.** was one of the ways that officials resisted efforts to integrate schools.
- 5.** The association that took legal approach and brought cases to the courts that challenged the practices of discrimination.

- 7.** In 1968, students protested the segregation of a bowling alley in Orangeburg.
- 9.** Was in the first graduating class of the new law school at South Carolina State.
- 10.** The Amendment that granted citizenship and "equal protection" before the law and "due process" of the law.
- 12.** Supreme Court ruled white primary was unconstitutional.
- 13.** 1st of 5 cases that led to the brown ruling - ruled SC had to make schools equal.
- 14.** Students in Rock Hill, SC that was arrested at a sit-in.
- 16.** A court case that required that the school district at least pay for the gas and repairs the used bus that the families had brought to take their children to school.
