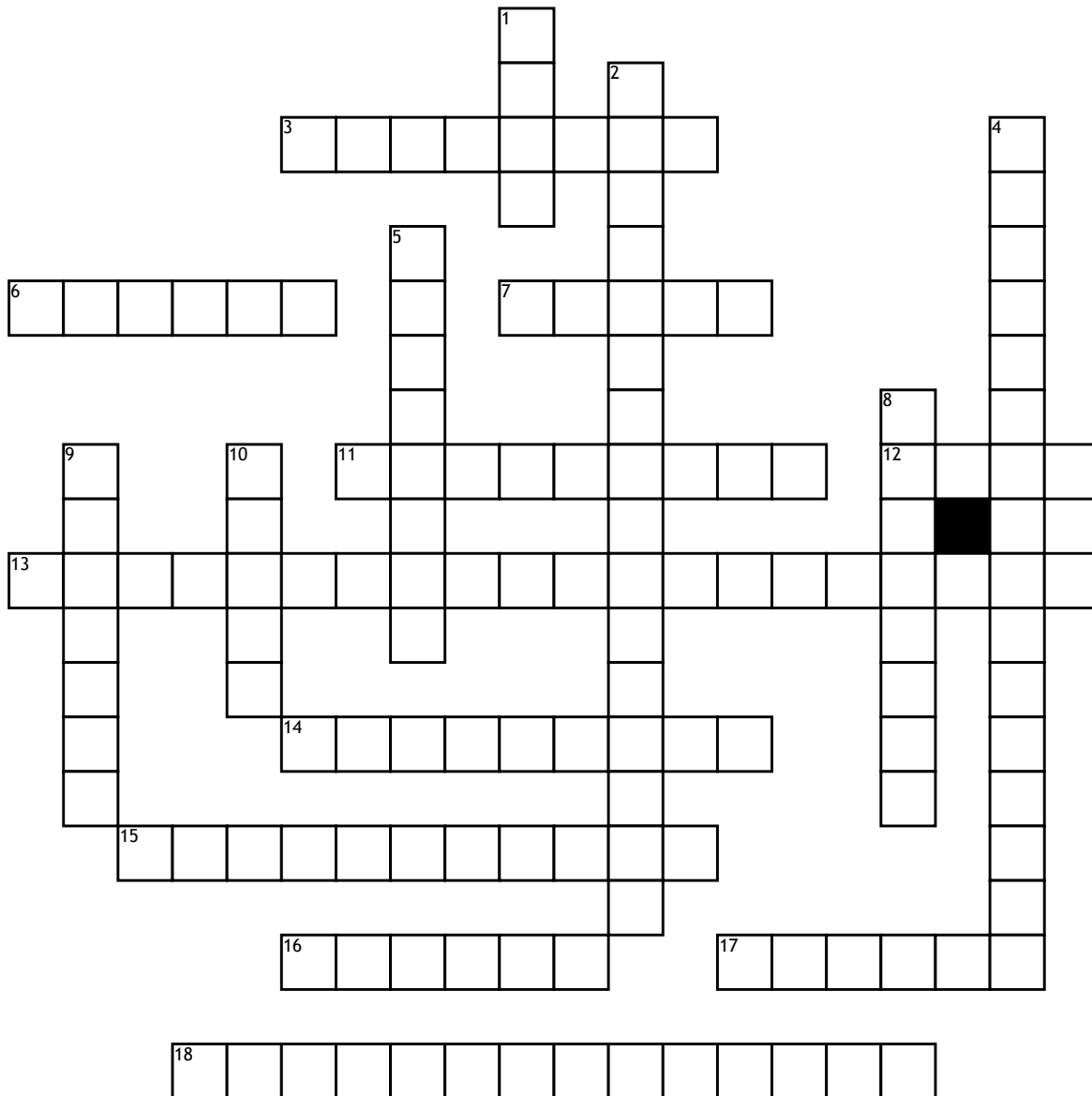

18. Wounds usually caused by sharp objects such as nails, thumbtacks, splinters, or sticks.
