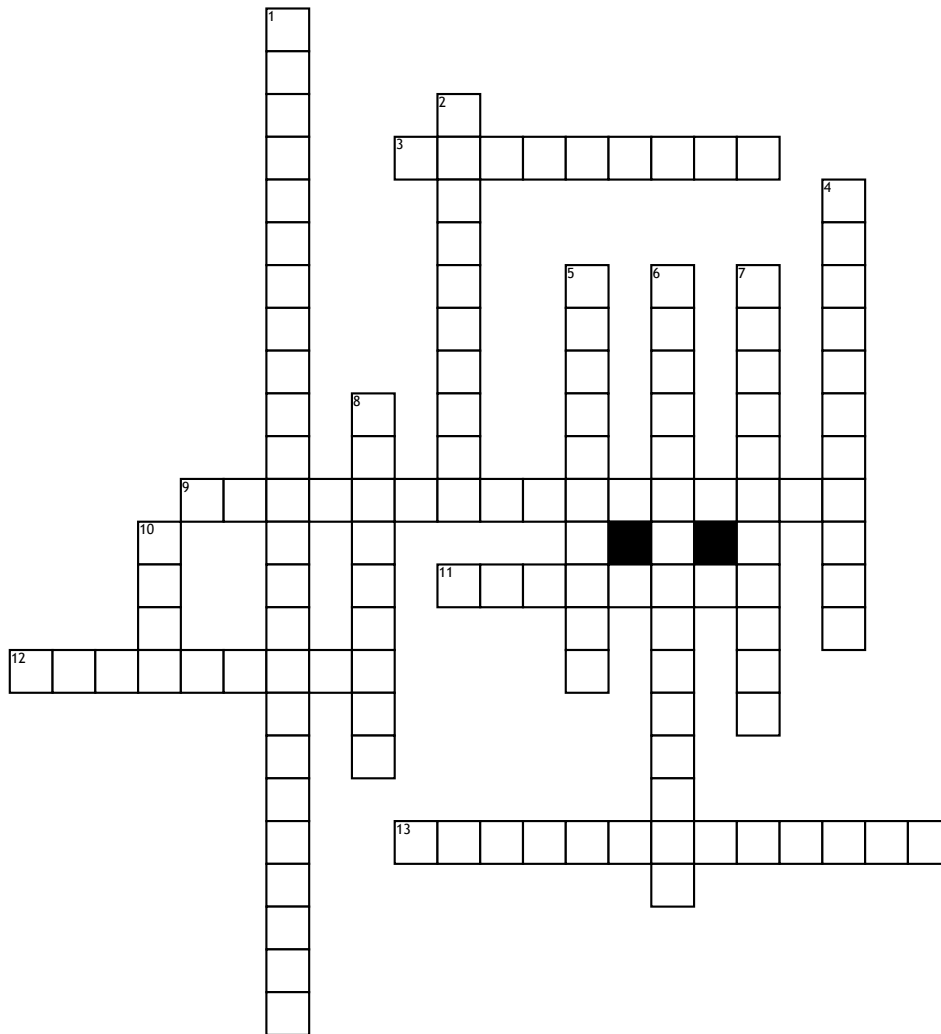

1. a brief interruption during which the character or narrator reflects a minor point, that seizes attention

2. a character who opposes the protagonist's goals and so creates the major conflict in the work

4. the main character in a work of drama, fiction, or narrative poetry

5. the obligation of the author to go back in the story and fill in the essential background information

6. originally applied only to drama, now often applied to fiction

7. beginning the narration not in chronological order with the first event in the plot but at some later point

8. "flashback" the dramatization of scenes set earlier in the story

10. a character who contrasts with the protagonist in ways that bring out a certain of his or her moral, emotional, or intellectual qualities
