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| 1. A set of principles relating to what is morally right or wrong. | A. Assault and battery |
| 2. information about the patient must remain private and can be shared only with other members of the patient's health care team | B. residents bill of rights |
| 3. Legal documents that allow individuals to state what medical treatment they want or do not want in the event that they want or do not want in the event that they become incapacitated and are unable to express their wishes regarding medical care. | C. Living Will |
| 4. to inform patients of their rights regarding decisions toward their own medical care, | D. agent |
| 5. Documents that allow individuals to state what measures should or should not be taken to prolong life when their conditions are terminal. | E. PSDA |
| 6. A document that permits an individual to appoint another person to make any decisions regarding health care if the principal should become unable to make decisions | F. Informed consent |
| 7. basic rule of conduct between patients and medical caregivers as well as the institutions and people that support them | G. Defamation |
| 8. law that promotes places to have a strong emphasis on individual dignity and self-determination. | H. Slander |

18. the crime of threatening a person together with the act of making physical contact with them.

19. the action of damaging the good reputation of someone; slander or libel.

S. implied contract

20. permission granted in the knowledge of the possible consequences, typically that which is given by a patient to a doctor for treatment with full knowledge of the possible risks and benefits.
