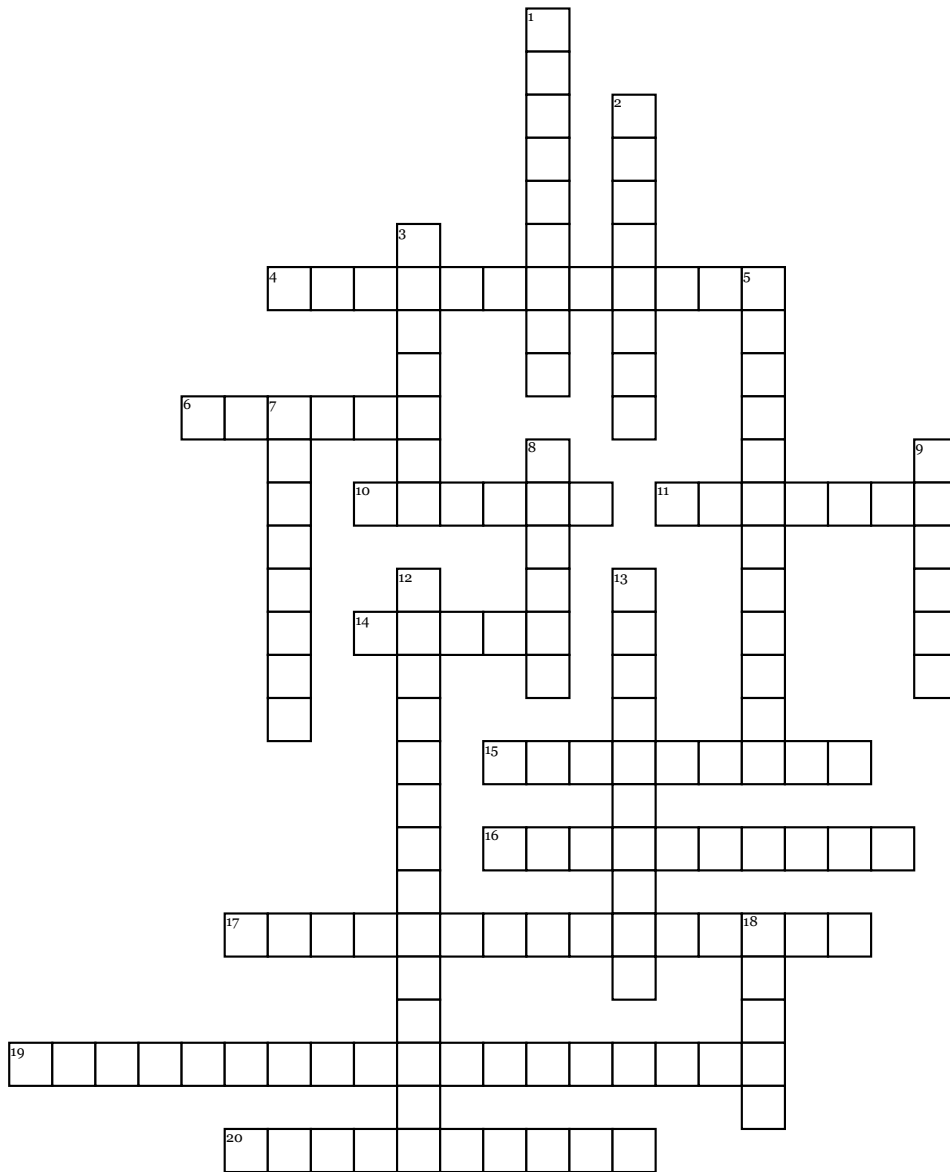

6. A figure of speech in which two things are compared using the word “like” or “as.”

14. The similarity or likeness of sound existing between two words.
15. The repetition of vowel sounds without the repetition of consonants.
16. The running over of a sentence or thought from one line of poetry to another.

19. A figure of speech in the form of a question that is asked to make a point rather than to get an answer.
20. The repeating of a word or phrase within a poem or a prose piece to create a sense of rhythm.

- 1.** A figure of speech in which deliberate exaggeration is used for emphasis
2. This is the combination of two terms ordinarily seen as opposites.
3. This is intense, descriptive language in a poem that helps to trigger our senses and our memories when we read it.

- 5.** This is the repetition of initial stressed, consonant sounds in a series of words within a phrase or verse line.

12. In a poem, a pair of lines that are the same length and usually rhyme and form a complete thought.
13. The repetition of consonant sounds. Although it is similar to alliteration, consonance is not limited to the first letters of the word.
