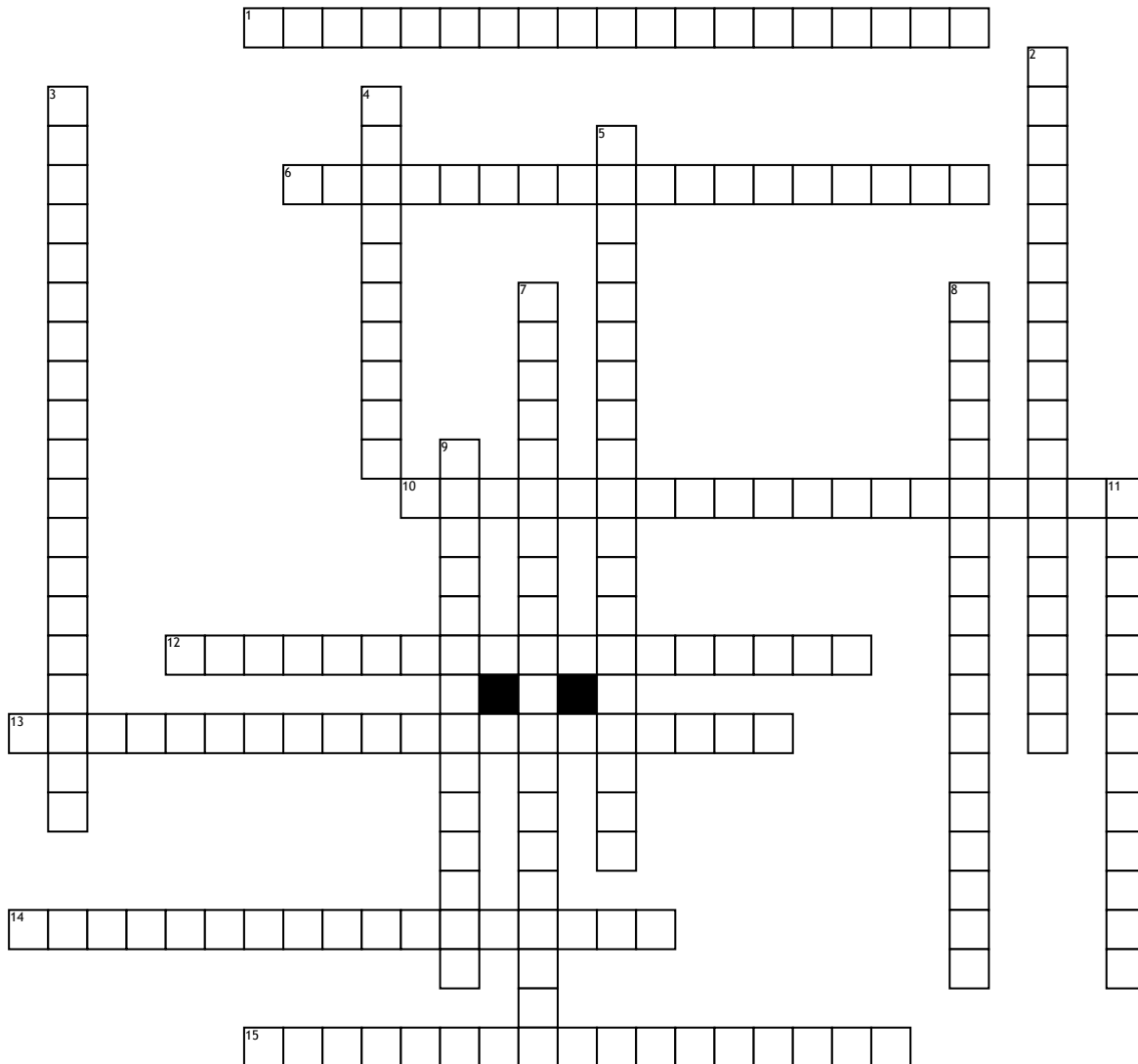


Religious Consciences

1. Inaccurately identified the goodness or evil of a moral act

 12. False belief that conscience is the only moral authority

14. Claimed certainty about the goodness or evil of a moral act, although that conscience might be wrong

15. Ignorance about the goodness or evil of a moral act that can be overcome by ordinary effort

2. Doubts the goodness or evil of a moral act

4. A judgement of reason in which humans recognize the goodness or evil of a moral act

7. Judges an action to be morally evil when the action is not morally evil

8. Judgement about the goodness or evil of a moral act, which is done before the action

9. Accurately identified the goodness or evil of a moral act
