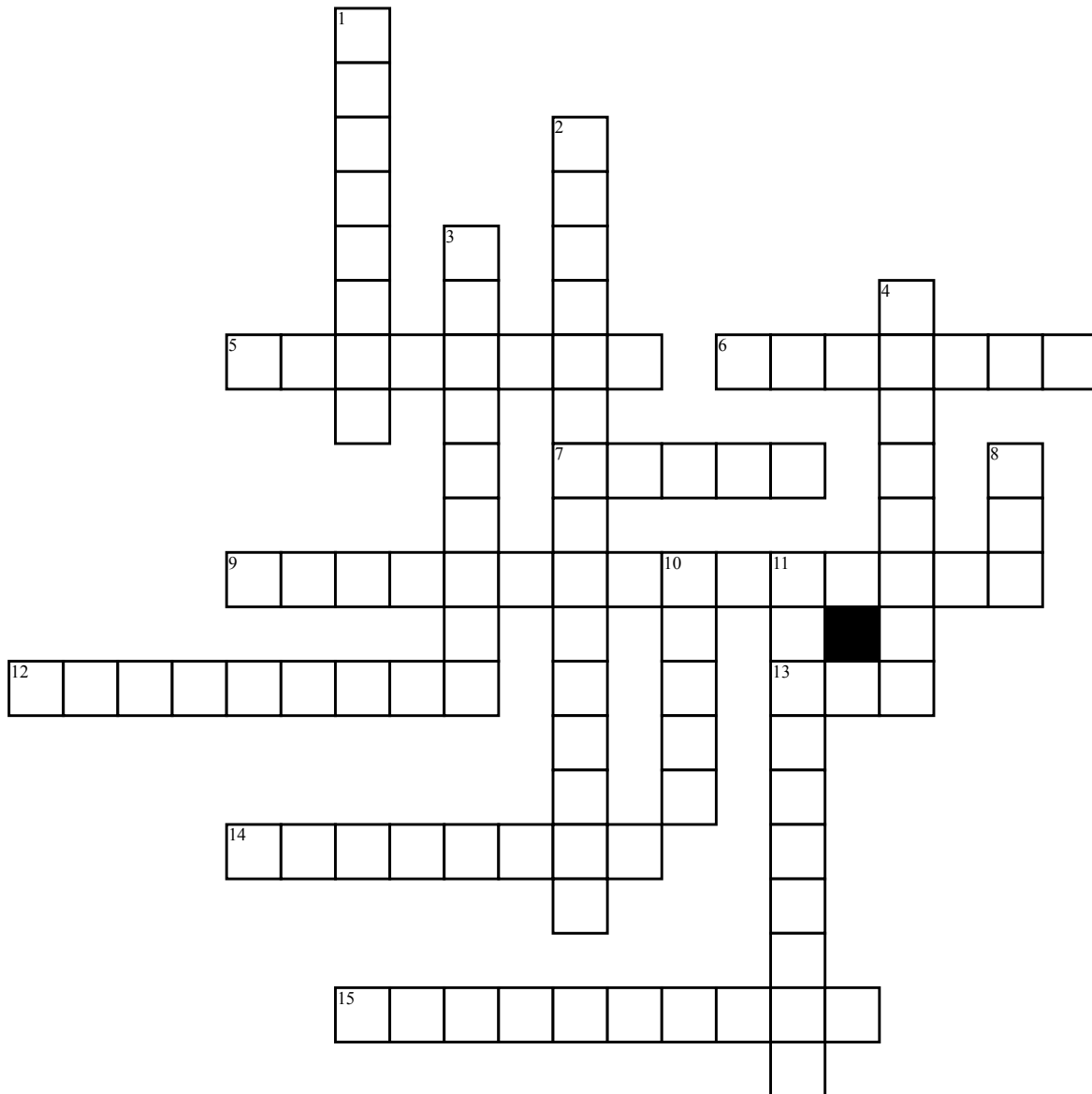


# Rhetorical Analysis Terms
