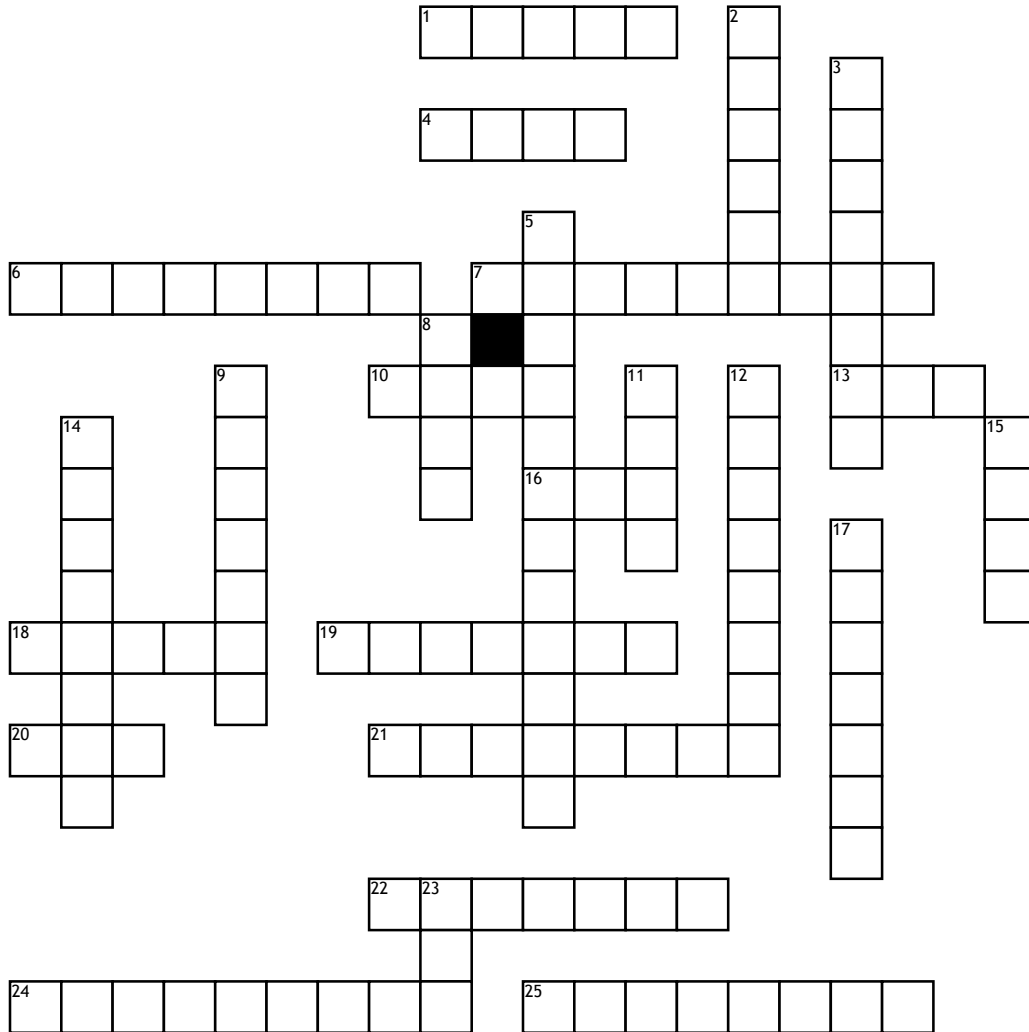


Typography Vocab

- 1. Small, finishing strokes on the arm, stems, and tails of characters
- 4. A character's downward projection such as on the letter 'Q'
- 6. An upward vertical stroke found on the part of lowercase letters that extends upwards
- 7. When a character doesn't have the finishing strokes
- 10. The curved part of character that encloses the circular or curved parts of a letter
- 13. Horizontal stroke on some characters that doesn't connect to a stroke or stem at one or both ends
- 16. The eye refers specifically to the enclosed space in a lowercase 'e'

- 18. A line marking the top of those lowercase letters, such as 'o', having no ascenders
 - 19. The process of adjusting the spacing between characters in a word
 - 20. A stroke that extends downward at less than 90 degrees is a leg, K and R
 - 21. A combo of two or more characters that are joined into one form which are not commonly combined
 - 22. The amount of space between lines of words
 - 24. The part of a letter that extends below the baseline
 - 25. The horizontal stroke across the middle of the uppercase 'A' and 'H'

- 2. A small distinguishing mark, such as the diacritic on a lowercase 'i' or 'j'

- 3. The end of a stroke not terminated with a Serif
- 5. A type of curve at the end of any stroke that doesn't include a serif
- 8. The lower portion of the lowercase 'g'
- 9. The open space in a fully or partly closed area within a letter
- 11. The main, usually vertical, stroke of a letter
- 12. An area entirely or partially enclosed by a letter form or a symbol
- 14. The curved stroke aiming downward from a stem
- 15. A small projection off a main stem
- 17. The height that lowercase letters reach based on height of lowercase 'x'
- 23. A small stroke extending from the upper-right side of the bowl of a lowercase 'g'
