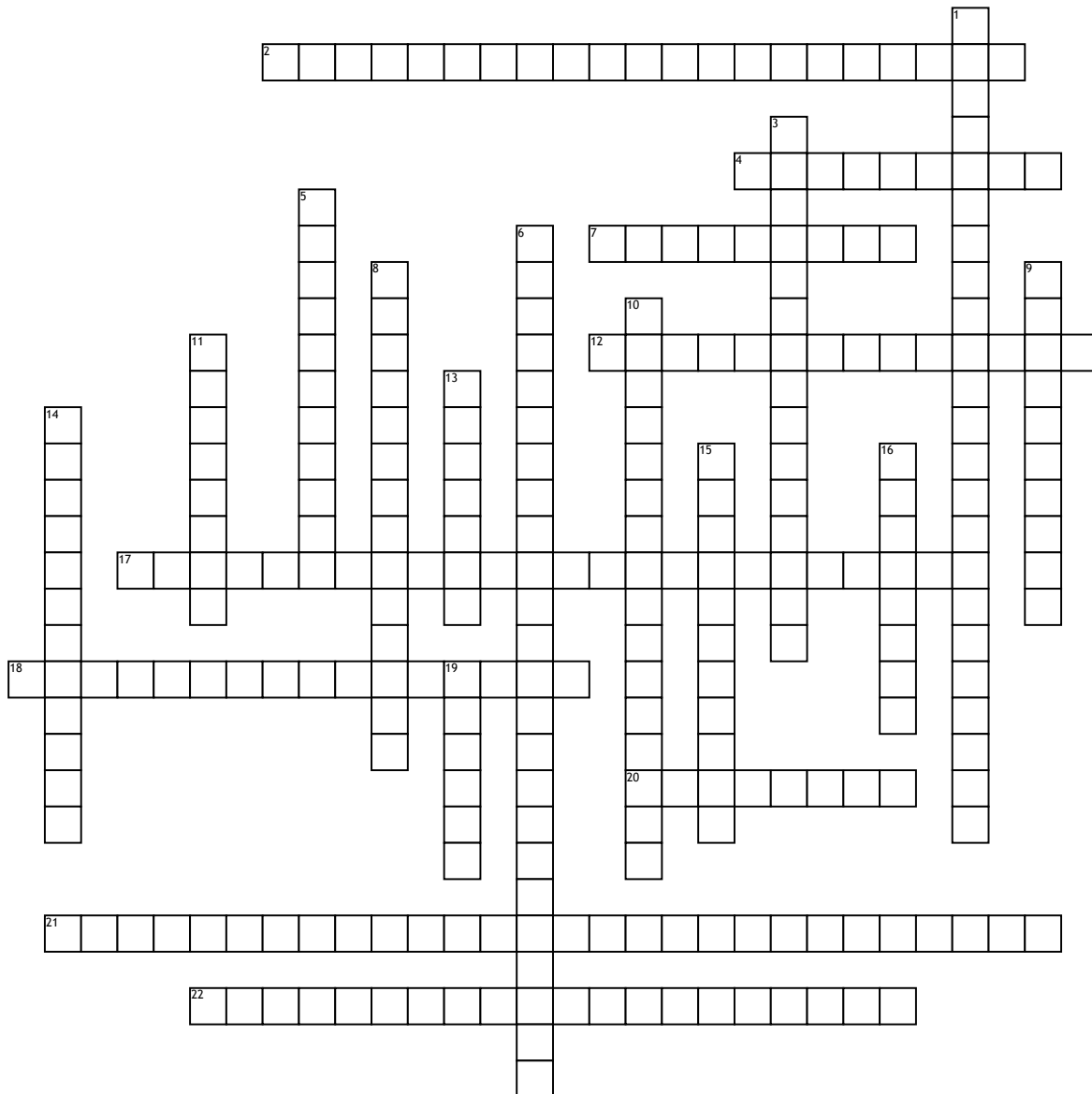


# West Virginia : Road to statehood

2. took place from September 12 to 16, 1861 in Pocahontas and Randolph counties  
 4. water brought or affected by tides (Chesapeake Bay)

 12. He was a VA lawyer and politician. He was a founder of WV. (Father of WV)  
 17. They decided to separate from the US in June 25, 1778.  
 18. He was the governor VA during the early years of Reconstruction. He was also a lawyer and politician.  
 20. a slope leading from the base of mountains (flat section)  
 21. they divided Virginia up and it wasn't official till June 20, 1863  
 22. it took place on July 11, 1861, in Randolph County, Virginia, (Now WV).

1. On May 13, 1863 delegates who attended the wheeling considered the Ordinance of Secession. (27 delegates attended)  
 3. Resolved the issue of slavery in WV. by limiting slavery for children who's parents were slaves. After July 4, 1863 children will be free.  
 5. The first and oldest of the overseas dominions of the kings and queens of England.  
 6. They divided the counties on August 13. They created a new state called West Virginia. More delegates came. (100) They decided to put Pierpont, Willey, and Carlisle senators and to restore Virginia.  
 8. He was career military officer. He became a Confederate States army brigadier general. He was the first general officer killed in the civil war.

9. a vote for the members of electorate on an important public question. (referendum)  
 10. Formed part of Western Virginia Campaign. It was fought on June 3, 1861. first organized land action of the war.  
 11. Soldiers marching or fighting on foot  
 13. soldiers who fought on horseback  
 14. Was a American merchant, lawyer, senator, etc. He was supporter of the union cause. Also, represented the loyalist faction of VA.  
 15. He was a Confederate States Army veteran. Became the first amputee of the war after being hit in the leg by a cannonball.
