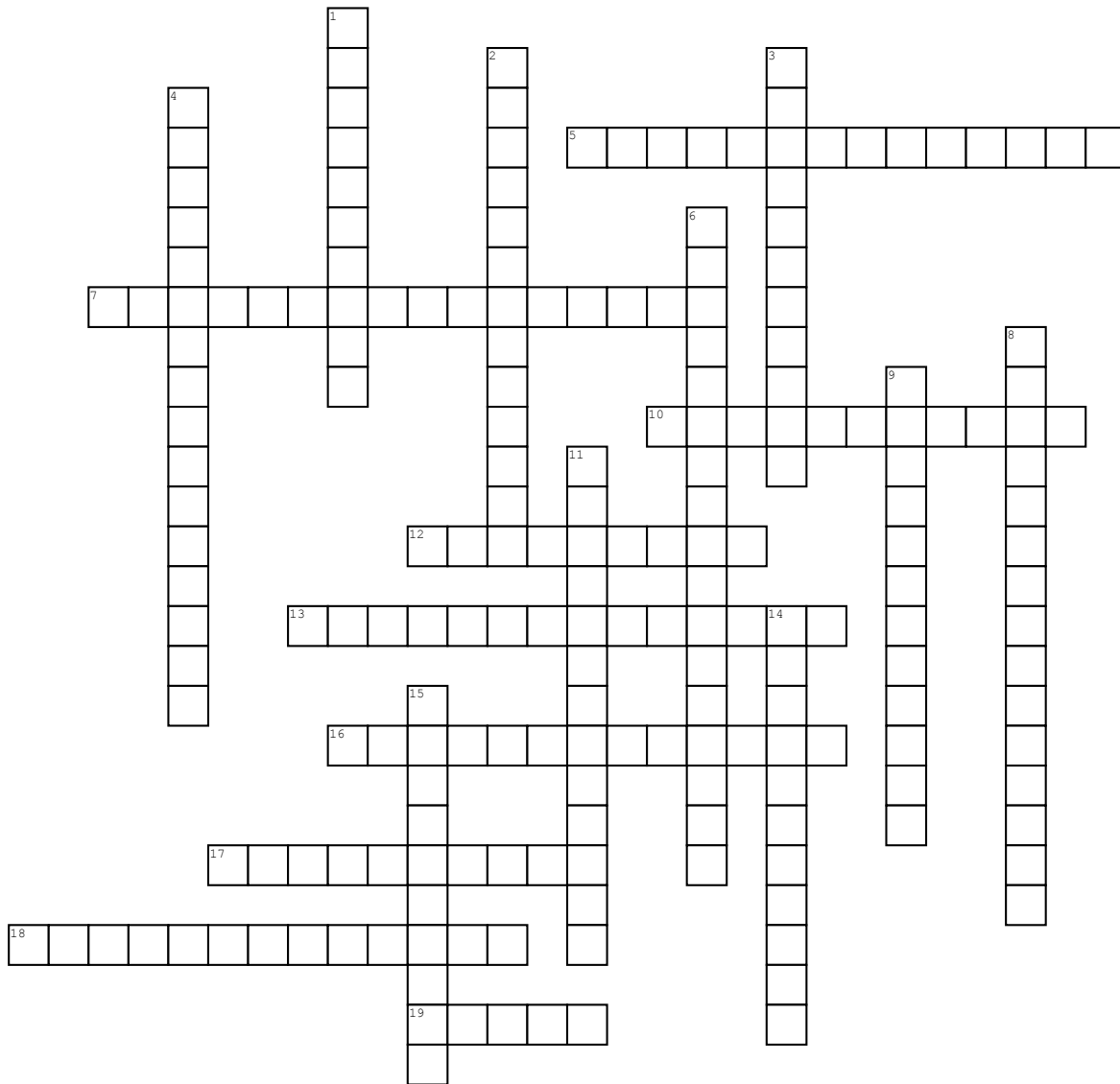


Women who bloomed through history
