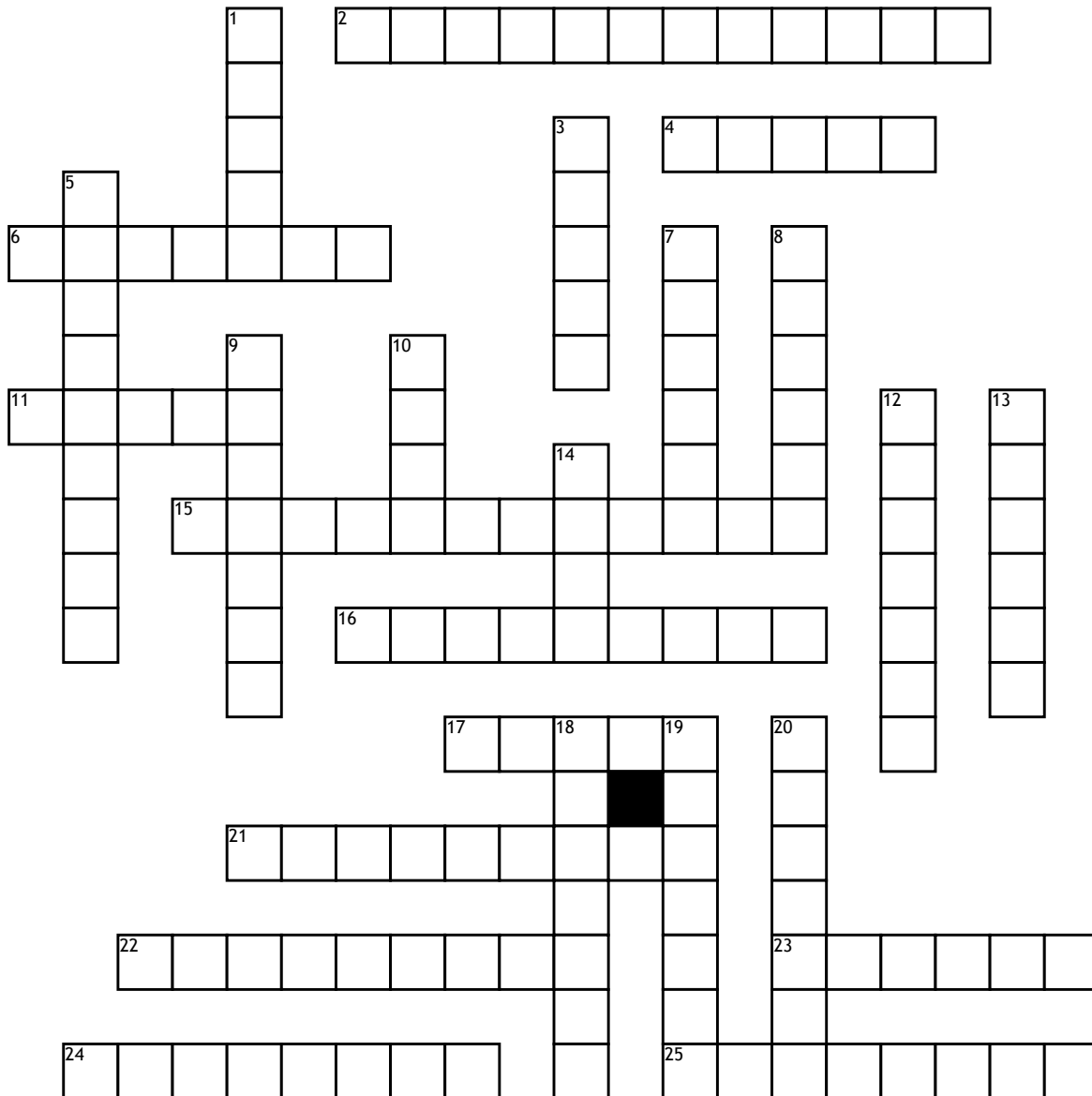


# Words from other Languages
